THOUGHT FOR THE MONTH

This month Jenny McCloy shares her thoughts on what we should be focused on at this time of year.



Do you love Advent with all the preparations and anticipation of the season? Or are you beginning to get stressed by the speed at which Christmas is approaching, especially with all the inevitable questions... 'Are you ready for Christmas?' 'Have you done your shopping?' 'Have you written your cards yet?' (Don't even mention the price of postage!) 'What colour theme will you have on your tree this year?' (this was a question I heard asked at a garden centre recently, when surrounded by various themed areas of the store!).

STOP...

...just chill and consider for a few moments what the season is actually all about----even though, in Christmas themed shops you will usually struggle to find anything which speaks of the true meaning of Christmas, maybe the token Nativity scene!

In Advent we are preparing to celebrate the birth of Christ, but also waiting for the Christ who will come again, even though we don't quite know when that will be.

The Advent season is a time of preparation that directs our hearts and minds to Christ's second coming.

Advent (from ad-venio in the Latin, meaning 'to come to') is the beginning of the church's liturgical year... the season leading up to the celebration of Christmas. There are many ways to prepare our hearts and minds for the coming of our Saviour, Jesus Christ, and to remind us of the true meaning of Christmas.

Children will point you to Advent Calendars, with a new door to open each day in December, revealing a picture behind each one, loosely connected with the season, culminating with an image of the Nativity on 24th December. These now have the added bonus of having a chocolate behind each door!

A tradition in our family (which we are pleased that our 'children' have continued with our grandchildren) is the lighting of the Advent Candle at the beginning of each evening meal in December.

Both of these and other commercialised ways of preparing don't actually begin on Advent Sunday, (December 3rd this year) but just follow December's days.

We are also reminded at Advent not just to prepare for the celebration of Christ's birth, but also to anticipate Christ's second coming, when we will be expected to account for the way we have lived our lives. This concept carries with it difficult and disturbing issues, but it is one which features strongly in Christ's teachings, not least in the Parables.

The broad thrust is that a time of judgement WILL come. It always used to concern me that God would be judgemental, until I accepted the fact that he is ultimately a God of love, who is full of compassion and forgiveness. This is a message that brings both promise and challenge---the assurance that good will finally triumph over evil, but on which side will our lives tip the scales?

Have we used our gifts wisely?

Have we thought of others as well as ourselves?

Have we been honest and above board in all our dealings?

Have we offered forgiveness in the way that God has repeatedly forgiven us?

Have we responded to the call of Christ to love the poor, the weak and the hungry?

The response to these questions is needed here and now!

The day will come when we will answer before God: do you remember the Gospel reading when John Sinclair led worship? Matthew 25:1-13 which tells the story of the ten bridesmaids who went to meet the groom, five of them were foolish and didn't have enough oil in their lamps and so weren't ready when the bridegroom came. Verse 13 reminds us to 'Keep awake, therefore, for you know neither the day nor the hour'.

When will the day come when we must answer before God. Is it time to take a long hard look at our lives to see whether anything needs changing. And, if it does, isn't it time to do something about it?

Enjoy the preparations during Advent but be mindful of God's challenge to us too.

Wishing you every blessing as we approach this Holy Season.

In the UK about 20 million slices of bread are thrown out every day. Revive a stale loaf by sprinkling with a little water and giving it 30 second blasts in the microwave, alternatively make Apple Charlotte, Bread and Butter Pudding or Summer Pudding. Or turn it into breadcrumbs and use it to thicken soups or to replace pine nuts in a pesto.

Don't forget, you can recycle the following items at London Street:

Empty Printer Cartridges, Aluminium Containers and Foil, Batteries, and Plastic Milk Bottle Tops.



Can you help to make sure that no one in our local community goes hungry?



Items **urgently** needed: Christmas Crackers, Deodorant (Male/ Female), Hot/Cold Desserts (Not Rice Pudding), Hot Chocolate, Long Life Fruit Juice, Loo Roll, Powdered Milk, Savoury Spreads (Marmite/ Peanut Butter/Meat Paste etc.), Tampons, Washing Up Liquid.

Items needed: Biscuits & Snacks, Cooking Sauces, Custard, Household Cleaning Products, Squash, Sweet Spreads (Jam/ Marmalade etc.), Sweets/Chocolate/Other Sweet Treats, Tinned Meat (Hot e.g. Chilli/Hot Dogs/Stewing Steak), Tinned Spaghetti/Ravioli.

Please **do not** give Baby Food, Hand Soap, Hot/Cold Cereal, Men's Shampoo, Non-dairy Milk, Pasta, Pet Food, Pulses, Rice, Sanitary Pads, Tea, Tinned Beans, Tinned Rice Pudding, Tinned Soup, as these are already in surplus.

A Message of Thanks from Maggie Morgans

I would like to express my sincere thanks to our wonderful church family who have shown so much love and support to Richard and me in the last few difficult years. Thank you too for supporting our family at Jeff's funeral on October 24th. He is at peace now after a very long period of declining health.



As most of you know, dear Richard developed early Alzheimer's disease some years ago. He could no longer manage in his own flat and so has lived at home with us for 2 years. In the summer, he started having seizures and now needs more care. He has just moved into a small, supported living home in Darlington Road where he will have full-time carers. At the same time, he retains his charming sunny nature and love of humour and has already endeared himself to the staff there.

This is a huge transition and there will be some teething troubles settling in, not least the separation from his old mum - a wrench for us both. However, I have decided to take the opportunity to visit my 90-year-old sister, Mary, in South Africa, over Christmas. My daughter, Fiona, will see that Richard gets together with some of the family. He still wants to come to church and so hopefully that can happen when I return.

I will have more time to see my older son, David, who few of you know. He has long-standing schizophrenia and lives quietly in Oxford. He was a gentle and scholarly young man, but this cruel disease struck, causing turmoil and robbing him of so much. Despite this, I value the sustaining power of God's love, demonstrated through you, and I look forward to new things next year.

A DEPARTED FRIEND

Joyce Cook shares her memories of our recently departed friend, Eileen Poulter, who died on the 11th November.

I remember Eileen coming to Ladies Club with her sister Sheila in about 1986. She introduced her sisters-in-law as well. They also came to Friendship Hour. At first Eileen was still worshipping mainly at Trinity but gradually came to be with us at London Street, and going to Trinity for their Ladies afternoon meeting. She was welcomed into membership here at London Street on 29th November 1998.

She gradually took up committee posts for Friendship Hour. In about 2000 she became secretary and stayed in that position until the group folded around the start of Covid.

Eileen had been a draughtsman and was a very good artist. A great

reader and she was also a lover of history.



She belonged to many local organisations including the Basingstoke Arts Club, The Field Society and the Basingstoke Concert Club, also the RSPB. I know she was a keen gardener and was known for bringing home cuttings after a day out in the countryside. I am sure there were other societies as well.

After Cynthia Yeomans gave up the House Group at Pages, Eileen took on the role, with Grace Springfield, of co-hosting the weekly bible study house group. This finished about 6 years ago I believe.

Eileen did not like some of the modern means of communication but was a great letter writer and very often I would look out my kitchen window and see her hurrying passed to get to the post box for the night's collection.

When I left Basingstoke in 1989, Eileen was mainly a member of Ladies Group and Friendship Hour at London Street. When I returned to Basingstoke in 2003 and was fortunate to receive one of the bungalows it was to find that Eileen had also just moved in three doors away. We were both widows and became firm friends during our time of living in Pages.

Eileen went on many coach holidays all over UK, and she had a love of visiting new places. She also ventured abroad and enjoyed some cruises.

The last three years we have kept in touch by telephone as she moved to live with Sheila. This was very good for both of them during Covid

especially.

I, and all who knew her, will miss her but are just happy that we had the joy of knowing her as a friend.


