THOUGHT FOR THE MONTH

Joy Williams explores how we can make the best of our God given gifts.



1 Peter 4:10 Each of you should use whatever gift you have received to serve others, as faithful stewards of God's grace in its various forms.

Watching bird behaviour at a feeder is a highly entertaining occupation for us in this country but we are not alone. I found this piece written by a very aptly named American named Jay E. Adams who also finds watching them fascinating, and writes that under the roof in his back yard hangs a hummingbird feeder that he keeps filled with sugar water. There are four openings in it from which birds may suck the nectar. Yet, day after day, from early morning until after dusk, the feeder is the source of their own private version of Star Wars. One bird chases all the others away.

As I said, Adams writes, "There is room for four birds at a time, and fully that number attempt to feed. But the 'top bird' who now 'owns' the feeder, will not let them. All day long he sits on the branch of a nearby apricot tree guarding 'his' feeder and defying others to transgress on what he has established as 'his' territory.

This ongoing slice of life confronts us throughout the day as green and red hummers streak across the yard, the king hummer in hot pursuit of an intruder. While the chase is on, others sneak a sip or two, only to be driven off when he returns.

The whole business has become a sort of parable for our family. Here is an example of grace: I bought the feeder; I supply the sugar water. The birds do not earn it; they receive it all FREE. Yet, day after day, they fight over who may enjoy it.

How like the people of God! All we have or are that is worthwhile is the gift of God's pure grace. And yet we can be proud, self-centred, envious, and quarrelsome. Often, we fight over God's good gifts rather than expressing our gratitude in humility and sharing what we have been given with others. Just as I am confronted daily with rivalry in my yard, even so God is confronted daily with rivalry in His."

Prayer:

Thank you, loving, generous and gracious Father, for all I receive from you day by day. You have given me so much, may I learn from Jesus' life and teaching how to use it in the service of your Kingdom. May I be a faithful steward, sowing and reaping as the Holy Spirit directs knowing that you are always faithful and your resources infinite.

WHAT WE BUILD ON EARTH

Revd. Josh Thomas discusses our tendency to discard rather than repair, in all matters.

We recently took a trip out to the Weald and Downland Museum just outside of Chichester. I had been there as a child but not for many years. Sometimes when you go somewhere as a child, you remember it differently, usually it is a lot smaller than you remember it, in fact I experienced this just the other day as I had an all-day meeting in Romsey where my Grandparents lived when I was young. I took a walk around the local park which used to seem massive to me as a child but as an adult, was disappointingly compact!

Back to the Weald and Downland though... this did not feel smaller, in fact it seemed much bigger to me as an adult! Perhaps, this was because I took much more interest in the history of the buildings or, perhaps, it was because I was dragging two small children of my own around the place, I must remember to ask my parents whether this was their experience!!

My Father-in-law was incredibly excited to visit the museum as it is, of course, home to the BBC television series 'The Repair Shop'. The premiss of this programme, I believe, has much to teach us today as Christians. In today's society, we are too quick to discard things that we consider are broken and not worth repairing, we give up far too easily and just go out and purchase something new. Now, of course, we know that this has environmental ramifications but that's someone else's problem, right? Well, no, not really... but that's another article.

We do this too often as people though, someone does something or says something that jars with who we are and what we believe, and we decide to ourselves that this relationship is over and replace that person with somebody else. Is this what God calls us to do? When a painting needs repairing in the Repair Shop, they don't just stick a patch on the canvas and paint over it. They strip it back, carefully cleaning off years or decades worth of dirt as well as the grime from previous attempts at "fix-it" jobs. They slowly weave the threads of the canvas back together, restoring it to its originally intended foundations. This is what restoration looks like in The Repair Shop. Not a disposal of the old thing, but a stripping back, a cleansing, a renewal of what was already there.

Paul talks about this in 1 Corinthians 3:12-15, he says; 'If anyone builds on this foundation using gold, silver, costly stones, wood, hay or straw, their work will be shown for what it is, because the Day will bring it to light. It will be revealed with fire, and the fire will test the quality of each person's work. If what has been built survives, the builder will receive a reward. If it is burned up, the builder will suffer loss but yet will be saved—even though only as one escaping through the flames.

Paul says that what we "build" here on earth, whether it's big things like relationships, structures, congregations and ministries, or the little things our days are made up of - the good things will survive when God renews all things, and the bad things will be burned away.

When it comes to the final day, all the corruption, evil and poor attempts at bodge it fix-up jobs will be cleared away. The things that remain will be goodness, love, purity in heart. What we do here and now, the effort that we put into our relationships with one another, really does matter, not just for now, but for all eternity.

'Therefore, my dear brothers and sisters, stand firm. Let nothing move you. Always give yourselves fully to the work of the Lord, because you know that your labour in the Lord is not in vain.'1 Corinthians 15:58.
