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## THOUGHT FOR THE MONTH

This month Alison Jamieson looks at Mark 15: 24-27.



There have been so many changes in the last few years and now, on May 6th, our new King, Charles 3rd, will be crowned with a lot of pomp and serious promise making in Westminster Abbey. We will see the occasion on TV and in the papers, but it is unlikely many of us will meet him during his reign. I wonder what we expect of him? He has quite a tough example to follow with 'Our Queen'. Only time will tell.

I am writing this just after Easter, when we sang 'Lives again our glorious King, where, O death is now thy sting?' Yes, we have another King, who proclaimed such a different kingdom from that of any earthly powers that they decided he had to die, he was too dangerous.

Tyler Staton's comment about the Mark reading is:

"I am struck by the word 'with' in this passage... And with him they crucified two robbers. With – If there's a word to sum up the life of Jesus that has to be it. At his birth, they called him Immanuel,

God with us....

Born with us

Walked with us

Talked with us

Lived with us

Suffered (and suffers) with us."

In the Luke account of the crucifixion, there is an account of a conversation between one of the robbers and Jesus. In the pain, suffering and humiliation they are both experiencing, the robber asks Jesus if he will remember him when he comes into his Kingdom and Jesus promises him that he will be with Jesus in Paradise.

Whatever we think of heads of state, be they monarchs or presidents they are only human. Our other king, Jesus, has entered into the lives

of ordinary folk and brought hope, healing, and new life following his death and resurrection and he now reigns forever, not remote but ever present.

*Lord Jesus,*

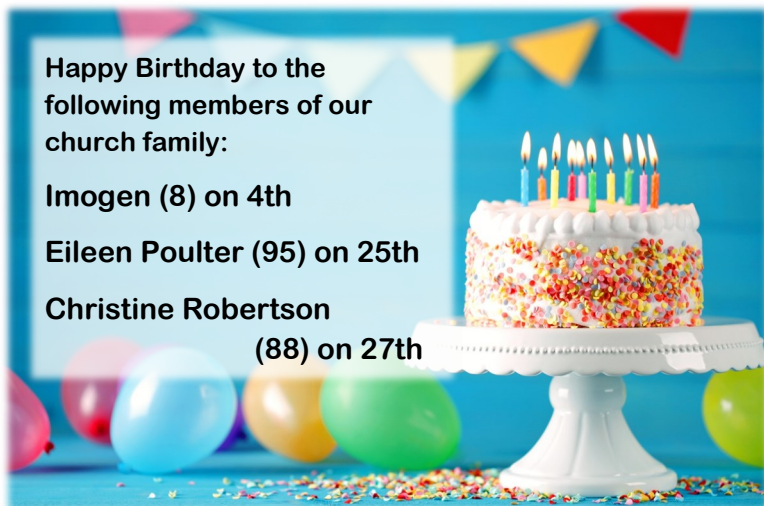
*I admit that I do not always understand you and your ways of doing things. But I think you can see how messy life, my life, can be and I ask for your help.*

## EXPLORING PSALM 139

**Jenny McCloy reimagines one of her favourite psalms.**

Some years ago, I went on an Elders' Away Day from our previous church in Stockport.

We were lucky enough to be very close to the High Peak Area of Derbyshire and our 'Away Day' was held in Whaley Hall which is in a small town called Whaley Bridge, which is known as the Gateway to the Peak District. You may remember hearing of this town in 2019 when the 1500 people living there were abruptly ordered from their homes over fears that a badly damaged dam on the Toddbrook Reservoir was about to burst and flood their homes. Fortunately, temporary repairs made it safe for residents to return to their homes a week later. The project to effect permanent repairs should be completed by 2024!

Whaley Hall is very close to the reservoir, actually situated on Reservoir Road. It is a place of worship, based on The Community of the King of Love, and a Conference and Retreat Centre. You may also have heard of Father Jamie, a Priest running the Retreat Centre, he had bought a painting in an antique shop for £400 in 1992, and it had hung on the wall in Whaley Hall (I must have seen it!!) collecting dust ever since. Then he decided to take it to The Antiques Roadshow in 2014, to have it valued. Eventually it was proved to be an original Van Dyck and was valued by experts at £400,000! Sadly it failed to attract even one bid at Christie's Auction House. It eventually sold for an undisclosed sum to a private collector and is now on loan to a museum in Belgium. Father Jamie used the money to restore the bells at Whaley Hall!

Back to the Away Day!

In the afternoon session we were challenged to use the time in silent, individual meditation. I found myself drawn to The Book of Psalms, Psalm 139 in particular. After reading it several times, I decided to rewrite the psalm in my own words, but following the theme of Psalm 139, which has always been a favourite of mine. Recently, I came across my effort and thought I would share it:

## COMMUNITY COOKBOOK

Jean Young shares a recipe from 'Persiana, Recipes from the Middle East and beyond' by Sabrina Ghayour.

### SHIRAZI SALAD

Serves: 2-3



A refreshing, vegetarian recipe which takes its name from the city of Shiraz in Iran which is eaten as an accompaniment to many meals or as a light meal with focaccia or crusty bread.

#### INGREDIENTS:

Half a large cucumber.

4 or 5 cherry tomatoes or tomatoes of your choice.

Half a red onion.

Salt and pepper.

Juice of one small lemon or half a large one.

1 heaped teaspoon sumac. (Available in Herbs and Spice Aisle in supermarkets.)

Pomegranate seeds 100g.

#### METHOD:

1. Slice cucumber lengthways into 4 strips, and de-seed, then chop into small dice.
2. Cut tomatoes into quarters or halves depending on size, de-seed and dice.
3. Peel the onion, cut into halves so that you have half-moon shapes, then finely dice.
4. Mix all together in a bowl and drizzle with some olive oil.
5. Season with salt, pepper, the lemon juice and sprinkle with the sumac. Gently mix together.
6. Add the pomegranate seeds and stir. Pop into the refrigerator for about 20 minutes as it is best served chilled.

## THE KING OF KINGS

With the approaching coronation, Revd. Josh Thomas discusses the limitations of earthly kings.



This month we see a new King coronated. As I shared a few weeks ago in church, I still struggle to get my head around the fact that King Charles is no longer the Prince of Wales but now I really must start getting used to the sound of the name King Charles...

Our faith has an interesting heritage when it comes to the appointment of a new king, let's just say, it didn't always quite turn out as planned for God's people. The books of 1 and 2 Kings were written to show what happens when people lose sight of God and turn their attention to earthly rulers instead.

As King David approaches death, he anoints his son Solomon to reign as king. Solomon starts off well enough asking the Lord for wisdom, but soon he disobeys God by worshipping foreign gods, accumulating a vast amount of wealth and conscripting fellow Israelites into slavery. All of this is in direct defiance of God's word and because of this, after his death, the Lord took the kingdom away from his son and this causes the people of Israel to divide into two separate nations, the northern kingdom of Israel and Judah to the south. Both of these kingdoms descend into idolatry although strangely, Judah sometimes stumble across a good king like Jehoshaphat, Joash and Amaziah. Israel, however, never have a godly ruler and they become more and more like the nations that they were before arriving in the promised land.

Elijah and Elisha as prophets are at the heart of the story, they are zealous for the Lord and perform many miracles, proving the power of

God over the false gods that are being worshipped by the people. Sadly, their prophetic word is mostly ignored by the people and God has to teach them a lesson by allowing two enemy nations to invade the land.

Because David had a heart for the Lord, his son, Solomon was able to lead Israel into a great new age. His reign was marked with prosperity, health, and wisdom, but something went wrong. He allowed his gaze to shift and began to be influenced by ungodly people, he started disobeying the word of the Lord and this led to the downfall of an entire nation. Yet another example of Israel getting things wrong, it would have been so easy for God to give up on them, but that isn't how God works is it? God still offers mercy and hope to His people.

As citizens of this land, we of course must show respect and honour to our new monarch, but in amongst all the pomp and ceremony of the next few weeks, I want to urge you to keep your eyes fixed on our true King, our risen Lord and saviour Jesus Christ. Where earthly rulers are subject to human failings, our King in heaven will always be a strong and stable foundation for us to build our lives on. So let us enjoy everything that is going to happen this month, but let us always remember to worship the King of kings.

## GOODBYE TO TRAIDCRAFT

**John Carrick Smith shares his report to Church Meeting, as the Traidcraft stall, sadly, prepares to close after many successful years.**

It is with sadness that I report to Church Meeting that Traidcraft plc went into administration at the end of January this year and, after 41 years working for trade justice, is no longer trading.

There has been a Traidcraft stall at London Street for most of that time (since 1986) and Margaret and I have run it since 1987. That's 36 years - and almost to the day!

In that time we have sold over £110,000 worth of goods through the stall although not all of it at London Street having held events at other churches and in people's homes.

There have been many achievements made during Traidcraft's lifetime that are to be celebrated, but also there is still much work to be done to achieve global trade justice. When we started few people outside churches had heard of Fair Trade, now you will have seen that many retailers stock Fair Trade items. I encourage those of you with Internet access to look at some of the websites on the fair-trade suppliers document Owen circulated for us.

Thank you to London Street URC for initially providing the capital for buying stock for the stall (long since paid back I hasten to add) and, after the refurbishment of the church buildings, for providing an on-site storage facility. It was a relief that we didn't need to find space at home for all the stock and lug boxes to and fro each week as we had been doing.

Thank you too to those who have bought from the stall, you have made our efforts worthwhile. I'm afraid the stock available now is very, very limited, and when we deem that the time is right we'll close the stall.

But with your help **WE HAVE MADE A DIFFERENCE**. Yes, it is sad that Traidcraft plc has gone but there are other businesses who have picked up the baton. Please keep looking for the Fair-Trade logo and keep fighting poverty through trade.

The charitable work of Traidcraft carries on. The charitable arm of the organisation was separated from the trading company some years ago and is now called "Transform Trade" having previously been named "Traidcraft Exchange". So the training and campaigning work etc. goes on and deserves our support.

Over the years the trading surplus from the stall has been used to make donations to Traidcraft Exchange and also this church. And when the stall has been finally sorted out, we will bring a proposal to Church Meeting on the dispersal of the balance of funds remaining in the account.

[UPDATE: After Church Meeting we received information from Transform Trade that a benefactor was doubling all donations made

before the end of April. With the agreement of the Church Secretary the total funds of £1,271.68 have been sent to Transform Trade to take advantage of this.]

We've enjoyed doing it. We've learnt a lot about international trade and the morally repugnant behaviour of some businesses. We've enjoyed handling some lovely items - and have bought quite a few too. We've enjoyed food (especially chocolate) that has been wonderfully tasty. We've learnt about the skill and determination of individuals, in the UK and the global south, who wouldn't accept the status quo and through their efforts have changed it. We've enjoyed a couple of Traidcraft Reps' Conferences and meeting staff at local events. We've been blessed by the support we've received from many people, but after 36 years we're relieved in some ways to be letting it go.

A heartfelt "Thank You" from us both.
