View from the Manse: The LORD bless you and keep you:

'The LORD bless you and keep you; the LORD make his face to shine upon you, and be gracious to you; the LORD lift up his countenance upon you, and give you peace.' (Numbers 6:24-26)

Over my holiday, one of the books I read was 'The Promise of Blessings' by Kate Patterson. I do commend this book to you, it is an easy read but contains much to challenge you. The blessing from the book of Numbers (shown above and known as the Aaronic Blessing) is one that I frequently use. Patterson reminds us that this was the blessing that Aaron the priest (brother to Moses) was instructed to speak over the Israelites by God. He was to use this blessing, but not over a people who were on a great spiritual high, and nor was he a priest of great holiness. In the absence of Moses (who was busy communing with God on the mountain) Aaron had permitted, even facilitated, the people to create a golden calf to worship in order to replace the apparently no longer present leader or God. The Israelites were in the desert after their miraculous and God-led exodus from Slavery in Egypt through Moses. What short memories people can have. So ready to rant against God in the bad times, worship God in the spiritually mountain-top moments then quick to give up in the spiritually desert-like moments. How guick are we to create our own golden calves that distract our energies and attention from what really matters. Aaron had made a big mistake in allowing the people to create their golden calf sculpture. The Israelites had made a big mistake in failing to truly trust in God. Yet even though both Aaron and the people found themselves, through their own disobedience, in this physical and now spiritual desert, God provided them with this greatest and most extravagant of Blessings, the Aaronic blessing, or as Patterson calls it, the shining blessing. God continues 'So I will put my name on them and I will bless them' (Numbers 6: 27). God blesses God's people that they may, in turn, bless others. God's blessing on us is not earned or necessarily deserved but comes when we yield to God. God's Blessing on the Israelites prepared them for the future promised land.

God creates and God desires to bless all that God has created. God blessed Adam and Eve, Noah, Abram and Sarai, Moses and Aaron, the Israelites, Joshua, Solomon, King David and Mary (Mother of Jesus). At the birth of Jesus, God's intent was that all would become heirs of that blessing given to Aaron. Jesus continues to bless us on a daily basis (our daily bread) in order that we become a blessing to others.

This world sometimes seems such a dark and broken place where so many walk through life feeling torn, broken and lost. Jesus came into such a world. Jesus came to bring hope and light into this world. To bless us in turn that we should bless one another and the world. When we choose to follow Jesus we become part of the priesthood of all believers and, as priests, we are given the authority to bless, just like Aaron, despite our own personal inadequacies. Words can be used to build up or knock down, words have power. When words are spoken in the authority of the name of Christ they are significant words, life changing words indeed.

Over the forthcoming year we will be thinking hard about our call to become disciples of Christ and what that really means in thought and deed. I was reminded the other day that the plural of disciples is 'church'. When we come *into* faith we come *into* community, for which the community of Father, Son and Holy Spirit is our role model. We are here to be blessed and bless the people around us, the communities in which we sit. So let us study alongside one another, led by the Holy Spirit, so that we may fully grasp Jesus' call on our individual lives and our church communities. May we love one another as Jesus loves us. Bless one another as Jesus blesses us. May we be a symbol, a signpost, to the kingdom of God yet to come in full.

Prayer Focus

Matthew 24 vv 31 46 ".....Lord, when did we see you hungry and feed you, or thirsty and give you something to drink? When did we see you a stranger and invite you in or needing clothes and clothe you? When did we see you sick or in prison and go to visit you? The King will reply 'I tell you the truth, whatever you did for one of the least of these brothers of mine you did it for me'"

What a cosmopolitan town Basingstoke has become! One cannot walk down the street, go into shop, ride on a bus or stand in a queue without hearing a foreign language. Reliable sources report that there are at least 73 different ones on record as being spoken here in this town. How many people that represents I have no idea but they will include people of all

ages - singles, couples and families, some fluent in English but many only knowing enough to just about get by and some knowing none at all. Imagine being a child or an elderly person and finding vourselves in a strange country, with a different culture and being unable to understand or speak the language. Imagine how a child with no English might feel starting school and imagine how lonely it must be for adults, especially the elderly, finding it difficult or impossible to adjust to the different culture. People come to our town for many different reasons and most have not experienced the freedom, peace, tolerance or standard of living that we almost take for granted. Their behaviour and our own is conditioned by the environment in which we live so it isn't easy to break the ice and make contact but the week October 23rd - 30th is designated as One World Week - may it be an opportunity for this church to learn more and welcome the folk from overseas who have come to Basingstoke to live. Spare a thought also for those who long to come here and for whom provision awaits but red tape prevents it happening.

Just as we cannot avoid noticing the foreigners in our midst so too we cannot avoid seeing the homeless and the addicts on the streets. The Food Bank regularly makes us aware of the many in this town who are hungry, poor, jobless or between jobs with no benefit coming in and also the many with long term health problems. A current prayer list is available from the Church Secretary. The Food Bank also is a way for us to give ongoing practical help and prayer for them. The box is in the Concourse.

Focus for Prayer:

- That opportunities will arise for us as individuals and as a church to be friendly and welcoming to those new to our shores.
- For those with little or no English the children starting school.
- For the older couples and especially the wives.
- For the families being supported back home by those here to work.
- For the quota of Syrian refugees coming to this country to be expedited.
- For the Food Bank its helpers, clients and donors.
- For the work of the Inter Faith Group.

Show You Care is the challenge being presented by Traidcraft this autumn. It is based on the idea that everyone might choose to make more of their regular grocery purchases 'FairTrade', and of course, preferably buy from Traidcraft. Fairly traded goods may cost a little more than regular equivalents but that little bit more makes an enormous difference to the suppliers. Through the fair trade premium the growers are able to work themselves out of poverty and to build sustainable livelihoods for themselves and families. Fair trade through Traidcraft is different and special. Traidcraft works with those suppliers who are beyond the reach of supermarket fair trade contracts, helping them to develop their skills and product quality. The training often comes from the charitable arm of Traidcraft called Traidcraft Exchange. Please see what you might be able to buy regularly from the stall, and if there is something in the catalogue that you want to buy we can get it and you won't pay postage.
