View from the manse:

'I too decided, after investigating everything carefully from the very first, to write an orderly account for you, most excellent Theophilus, so that you may know the truth concerning the things about which you have been instructed.' (Luke 1:3-4)

I just wonder what God makes of our foolishness! Does God laugh or cry in exasperation and anger at the faithlessness of his people? The words of the ancient prophets can feel eerily relevant to modern society at times.

The celebration of Christmas has become almost completely secular....how have we let this happen? The other day I visited some local garden centres as they are often the best sources of Christmas decorations. I was trying to source some bits and pieces for craft activities during advent. However, the more I looked, the more my heart sank at the lack of reference to anything to do with the birth of Jesus. For your festive tree you can hang any assortment of weird and wonderful things from plastic cows to sparkly dogs and to shiny shrimps. But the 'pièce du résistance' this year, amongst the tree hanging ornaments, has to be the glittery unicorns! What on earth have unicorns got to do with Christmas?! Hold on..... lets just rewind this!!! The atheists in society have campaigned hard to remove symbols of Christianity from public life because they deem it to be untrue. In their thinking, faith in Jesus is a fantasy based on the fabrication of an all-powerful God who, in their minds, just does not exit. For them the whole story of Jesus, the chosen one of God, born in a stable, is just a lie, and a dangerous one at that. Yet for some reason mythical creatures such as unicorns are acceptable. Mythical unicorns can be brought in all shapes and sizes and at great expensebut to sell that lie to our children is ok. What a weirdly distorted world we live in. Luke, at the start of his Gospel wanted to investigate 'everything carefully from the very first'; his concern was that through eyewitness accounts and going back to sources close to Jesus we 'may know the truth concerning the things'.

My daughter's friend comes from France. Her mother likes to come to England to celebrate Christmas now because it feels like a 'proper' Christmas. In her hometown you are not permitted to put up Christmas lights outside or in your windows because the secularisation of their society has gone to such an extreme that to publicly display any celebration of Christmas is deemed offensive to others! I pray that we are not blindly heading that way too. To be honest, I do not believe that Jesus was actually born on the day we celebrate as 'Christmas day', but I do celebrate that Jesus was born, that he came, the Holy one of God, born in a stable for ordinary people like you and me. Christmas without Christ is nonsensical! Christ is the 'truth' that I live for. Jesus came as Gods light into an often-dark world. So, let us display our lights and nativity scenes and Angels (angels not fairies!) with joy and hope in our hearts. Let us celebrate that Jesus came and hope for His return, his second coming, that all things may be made new and his truth and justice will reign forever.



Prayer Focus:

<u>Matthew 6: 6</u> 'But when you pray, go into your room, close the door and pray to your Father, who is unseen. Then your Father, who sees what is done in secret, will reward you'

A Bible reading note that I hope you will find helpful and hopeful, a way of leading into Christmas and the start of a new year?

"We usually place value on prayers being answered, but in the opening verse, Jesus places value on prayers being rewarded. What is the nature of the reward Jesus is talking about?

Jesus gives three significant ways in which prayer is rewarded. First is that it brings us into intimate communion with God. The Lord's Prayer begins, 'Our Father in heaven..... (Matthew 6:9). This is the first time in Scripture that God is addressed as 'Father' in a personal way.

The second reward is that prayer brings us into alignment with God. The communion with God in the first two clauses – 'Our Father in heaven, hallowed be your name' – leads to alignment with God in the second two clauses – 'Your Kingdom come, your will be done On earth' (Matthew 6: 9-10).). This is not about finding a middle road between our will and God's will, but about being totally aligned with the will and purposes of God.

The third reward is provision from God. The Lord's Prayer includes three personal requests: 'Give us today our daily bread. And forgive us our trespasses, as we forgive those who trespass against us. And lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil' (Matthew 6: 11-13). This comprises today what we need for today.

Intimate communion with God, alignment with God and provision from God are received from Him as a reward. Answered prayer is secondary to the blessing of knowing and experiencing Him this way"

What a dilemma for a slimmer Eating all that Christmas fare, Getting fatter, what's it matter? It's only once a year.


Now the party has begun, Crackers and cheese and party hats Turkey with trimmings, presents with ribbons, Figgy pudding – do we still eat that?

#Christingleso campaign

This year marks the 50th anniversary of the Children's Society bringing Christingle to this country with a service held in Lincoln Cathedral in 1968.



To celebrate this landmark anniversary, the Children's Society is running its #Christingle50 campaign, which aims to support vulnerable young people through raising funds at Christingle events and a collaboration with The Royal Academy of Music.

Some 200,000 10 to 17-year-olds in the UK are experiencing emotional neglect on a regular basis, and many are also struggling with other difficulties at home. The charity found that:

11% of 10 to 17-year-olds experiencing emotional neglect also do not have their own bed; 21% 10 to 17-year-olds experiencing emotional neglect had also been homeless in the last five years; and 20% of 10 to 17-year-olds experiencing emotional neglect also lived in a household that had used a food bank in the last five years.

Matthew Reed, Chief Executive of The Children's Society explains: 'Too many young people will wake up on Christmas morning like any other - feeling alone and unable to cope.'

The Children's Society has created an original song for schoolchildren, congregations or community choirs to include in their Christingle services. The song, 'Light a Candle', is available to download and listen to or learn for free from The Children's Society website

Association of Interchurch Families House 1968-2018



One dark, stormy evening in November 1968 Ruth and I, with two young children, arrived at Spode House near Rugeley for a small weekend gathering to talk about personal experiences of Catholics married to Christians of other denominations. Who would have thought then that as a result, fifty years after the Association of Interchurch Families (AIF) was founded, over 60

members and their guests met at the Hayes Centre in Swanwick on 13-14 October for a weekend to celebrate their Jubilee year.

Central to the celebrations was an ecumenical service of Evensong that paid tribute to the vision of the founders of AIF; the service was led by the Anglican Bishop Tim Thornton (Bishop at Lambeth) assisted by the Catholic Archbishop of Birmingham and co-chair of the Anglican-Roman Catholic International Commission (ARCIC), Bernard Longley and the Moderator of the Free Churches, Revd. Dr. Hugh Osgood.

Back in 1968 Canon Martin Reardon, his wife, . Ruth , and Fr John Coventry SJ recognized that couples from different church traditions who shared the sacraments of baptism and marriage often need a particular kind of pastoral understanding from their churches. They brought together a number of such interchurch couples for mutual support. From this group grew an association that has also become a forum through which interchurch couples can share with their churches their experience of living together in love across the denominational divide.

Their experience of sharing Christ's love across that divide, despite the challenges it presents, is a precious example of unity and a gift to the churches, summed up by Saint John Paul II in York in 1982 when he addressed interchurch families, saying, "You live in your marriages the hopes and difficulties of the path to Christian Unity".

In a keynote speech Archbishop Longley spoke of the role that AIF has played in making the churches aware of the pastoral needs of interchurch families, and of what it had taught many church leaders about the joy and the pain of their situation. Speaking of their immense gratitude to the Association, one couple at the weekend gathering declared that without the support of the Association and its members they doubted that their marriage would have survived the difficulties they had faced.

After 53 years of our own marriage, Ruth and I echo those thoughts.
