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View from the manse:

We are moving towards Pentecost and the launch of the 'Try Praying' initiative, through One Church Basingstoke and I believe that we are being summoned to pray 'for just such a time as this' (Esther 5:14). Recently I have been studying the book of Nehemiah and that has highlighted several aspects of prayer for me at the moment.

Firstly, deep prayer stems from deep burdens. We generally avoid burdens don't we?...elderly relatives will often speak of not wanting to become a 'burden' on their family whilst those who become unemployed or even street homeless are often frowned upon by others as being a 'burden' upon the state. But actually, God often places on our hearts a burden for others in the community, such as the elderly or the street homeless, and that burden should lead us to earnestly pray for those people and situations. The bigger the burden the deeper the prayer....so perhaps we should ask God to heavily 'burden' our hearts with the things that need prayer.

Secondly, those who have a burden to pray, should be open to how God wants us to make those burdens lighter through their actions. Prayer should be missional. When God burdens our hearts it is always with a purpose....so God what do you now want us to do? Is it to support projects with finances or skills or to be 'missionally' on the front line in some way, in the thick of doing a project? Nehemiah was Burdened with a desire to pray for Jerusalem and having prayed and fasted for four months he was then activated into going to Jerusalem to inspire and supervise the building of the city walls in an amazing 52 days! That is an almost superhuman engineering feet. It is superhuman because it is, I believe, led by the Holy Spirit through prayer. So that is approximately 120 days of prayer and fasting for 52 days building. More than twice the amount of prayer required for the mission. Interesting isn't it? I know I am very guilty of praying just a bit then wondering why not much is happening in mission! Is this a lesson for us all?

Thirdly, Nehemiah spent time on praise at the beginning of his prayer but then almost more time on confession. He was confessing sins that he was not directly involved in perpetrating, yet collectively God's people, the Israelites, had been faithless and errant. Nehemiah confessed to God on their behalf. He, like Jesus for us, took the sins of others upon himself. I am frequently dismayed at the poor behaviour of the institution of the church. The church should be a place of refuge for the least, the lost and the broken. So often it has been misused by those who have hidden the mistreatment of others or other moral misdemeanours behind the power and influence of the institution of the church (Chichester Diocese in the historical child abuse scandal is an example). Just about every denomination, every church, has had its skeletons in the cupboard. Sins that have been perpetrated then brushed under the carpet and conveniently forgotten. Sins stay within the DNA of a Church unless we root them out, name them, and confess them before God. Churches are made of fallible humans, there will be times when things go wrong but we must humbly confess when they do if we are to be an example of Christlikeness to the world.

Fourthly, we must hold on to the promises God has made to us through God's new covenant in Jesus Christ. We are, as Christians, to be part of his new creation, part of the new heaven and new earth. The full restoration of creation. And that is where our hope is...in Christ alone. Through the prophets God promised that He would 'put my law in their minds and write it on their hearts. I will be their God and they shall be my people' Jeremiah 31:3. At Pentecost, after the resurrection and ascension of Jesus, the Holy Spirit came to do just that. The Holy Spirit transformed their hearts and empowered them for the mission ahead.

Lastly, we need to be honest before God in prayer. Sometimes that may make us feel vulnerable or exposed. That may mean that prayer can feel emotional at times. God wants us to be real. To be truthful about our burdens and desires. Becoming real with God makes him become more real to us.

As you receive your Try Praying booklet just before Pentecost, spend 7 days working through the readings and prayer. Use it then lose it. In prayer, ask God who you should hand your booklet on to. Is it a neighbour, a work colleague, a family member or a friend? Use that book and then lose it. Prayer is for everyone.

Prayer Focus:

Good intentions

'What do you think of this? A man had two children. Approaching the first, he said, "My child, go and work in the vineyard today." He answered, "I'll go", but he didn't. The father went to the second and asked the same thing, and he answered, "Sir, I won't go", but he had second thoughts and went. Which of the two did the father's will?' They said, 'The latter.'

Matthew 21:28-31

How many times do we intend to do something but don't get around to doing it? Probably more often than we care to remember. It is so easy to make promises but so much harder to keep them. We simply forget, we're too busy or perhaps we feel we have 'bitten off more than we can chew' and our enthusiasm has run away with us or we are just too lazy. With luck, our failure to honour our intentions may have little consequence. But there will be times when it matters a great deal, having repercussions far greater than we envisaged. So, if God is calling us to do something and the job needs doing, we should act immediately as it may never come our way again.

This also means, of course, that we need to be good 'listeners' as well as good 'doers' if we are to fulfil our promises. If God is calling us to a task we need to pray about it and listen to Him. God listens and stays with us but does not give us advice all the time or try to fix things. He gives us the power, through His grace, to undertake that which we never thought possible.

Often, just listening to our friends, family, colleagues, neighbours and, yes, to strangers is all that is required to give them the help they need to cope with difficult situations.

To be able to carry out our good intentions we need to make a promise to ourselves to begin by listening.

However, speaking globally today, it is very hard to listen and respond to what we are hearing (is it true or fake news?) and so we pray that world leaders will listen to each other and make promises an alliances that will benefit everyone by thinking of the environment and by removing hatred, violence, greed and poverty.

Secretary's report for the AGM 12TH May 2019

Once again it is time to recollect and record all that has happened during the last twelve months in the life of our church.

I'm sure you will agree that we should offer great thanks to Kay for all the work she puts into the life of this church, her work with the other churches in Tadley and the local community. We only see the end results but there are many, many hours of preparation that we don't see.

Also my thanks go to Janet who jointly is church secretary and our Elders who make great contribution to the running of the church.

We have continued to have morning services in our church throughout the year, with the occasional exception when we joined with London Street.

At Easter again a number from London Street were able to join with us for a service on the evening of Maundy Thursday and also for the very early Sunrise service in the skate park on Easter Sunday morning which was followed by a full cooked breakfast in the Immanuel Centre. Thank you to all those who shopped, set up, cooked, washed up and tidied up.

Kay has continued to lead one Sunday service each month, along with additional services at Christmas and Easter. The other Sundays have been filled by our own members and by visiting preachers. Despite our diminishing numbers attending on a Sunday morning it is encouraging to know that our visiting preachers are still willing to come on a regular basis. Thank you to Janet for organising the preaching rota, it is not easy job finding someone to fill three or four Sundays a month. And thank you also to those who have coordinated for our visiting speakers. I don't know why we should be surprised but God has once again provided us with timely, relevant and challenging messages from our visiting speakers. As a church it is always good to be challenged. The church family have enjoyed a large number of events over the last twelve months. We joined with London Street to go to see the Life of Christ at Wintershall. Fortunately the weather was kind and a wonderful day was had by all. The production and standard of acting were extremely good and the various 'settings' added to the atmosphere of the story. We hosted a summer BBQ for London Street and ourselves at the Immanuel Centre. It was really nice to have a social time together and continue to get to know each other better.

Roast Club was launched in August and has continued on the second Sunday of each month. Thanks to Mark and Julie for suggesting and organising this. It not only caters for our own church family but has also welcomed others from various local churches.

A small group from our church joined together to watch and learn from some teaching DVDs that Mark and Julie had brought back from New Wine in July.

In September London Street had a request for three full immersion baptisms. Unfortunately due to concerns over the strength of the floor at London Street the baptistry could not be used there, so it was our pleasure to invite them to use the Immanuel Centre.

Mark and Julie along with Janet & myself ran the Marriage course beginning in October. We were really encouraged that we had eight couples, including couples from Basingstoke and Reading, attend and enjoy the course. A big thank you to those who cooked meals and provided desserts. Each week we were complimented on the quality of the food. And they all enjoyed and benefitted from the course as well.

To mark the centenary of the end of the First World war we hosted a Remembrance exhibition. Thank you to those who provided displays and gave their time.

Some of us accepted the invitation to join a skittles evening organised by London Street in November. Again it was a good social sharing time.

A special guest at the skittles was Paddington Bear who came to visit our church and participate in as many activities as possible. We managed to keep him busy with the skittles evening, attending an Elders Meeting, joining in with Little Angels and the Brownies and of course worshipping with us on a Sunday morning.

Christmas as always was a busy time with the regular services and events. We hosted the CTAT Living Nativity once again which as usual was very well attended. We also helped to make and distribute around Tadley the knitted Christmas Angels. They generated quite an interest and conversation and were deemed a novel way to spread the good news about Christmas.

Mark and Julie coordinated the Christmas day lunch at the Ambrose Allen Centre again along with many volunteers. This is a wonderful event which brings people together who would otherwise be alone on Christmas day.

We have recently held two Vision Days to spend time reflecting on the way forward for the church. These have been well attended and have brought to light various needs within the church. Together with the message and teaching from Spring Harvest, which a good number of us attended, prayer has been identified as a priority for the church.

We have, of course, continued to maintain and improve our property. We had a newly refurbished sign put up on the Immanuel Centre, some external and internal lights have been repaired and replaced, carpets have been cleaned and some work has been done trimming deadwood from our trees and clearing the undergrowth along one of our boundaries. The users of the Immanuel Centre hall have changed during the year. The Foodbank relocated to Tadley Common Methodists but we now have the 1st Tadley Brownies meeting every week during term time. They appreciate using our hall and it is a good link to our community. The Pilates group has continued on a Tuesday morning and has now added an evening session. We have continued to get our policies up to date and have issued our Health and Safety Policy and Fire Policy during the year. We now embrace the latest in social media thanks to Mark & Julie who have set up our church Facebook and Instagram pages. Please do have a look.

To summarise then, as we say each year, all of the things mentioned in this report wouldn't have happened without your support and hard work. So much goes on in and through our little church that it is easy to overlook all that has been done during the year, so this report is a good way of reviewing all that has happened. So a big, big thank you once again to all those who have kept our buildings and graveyard clean and tidy, the welcoming team and coffee makers, our musicians and Songpro operators who help us worship. Those who have provided lifts and visits. It is all part of your worship to God and helps to spread God's love here in Tadley and elsewhere. Thank you so much for being willing to serve this church, church family and local community.

We do have our challenges to face as we go forward. Our numbers are steadily reducing, and while the numbers attending on a Sunday morning are not everything, we do realise that we need some new younger people to make the church sustainable, and to continue the work of this church if it is God's will. Please pray for the future direction of the church, our Minister and our congregation that God will reveal to us His plans, whatever they may be.

So as we come to the end of another busy year, and continue to look forward to the new opportunities that God has in store for us, may we continue to be open to His leading through the power of His Spirit, take time to listen to His voice and give thanks for His presence with us. Tadley Treasurer's Report for AGM (2018 Accounts)

A. Income

- 1) Overall income down again to £53,581 from £55,640 last year. Down £2k
- 2) Investment income rose from £6,042 to £9,478. Up £3.5k
- 3) Offertory increased slightly from £23,931 to £25,213. Up £1k
- 4) Legacies just £307 received in 2018. Down almost £3k
- 5) Our major income was Offertory income making up >50% total income including tax refund (£32,441, 60%) with investment income next (£9,554, 18%).
- 6) General projection in 2019 we anticipate that income will be lower in 2019 (due to reduced offertory income & probably investment income despite a small possible rise in hall hire income). Our Projected income for 2019 = £50,000

B. Expenditure

- 1) Overall expenditure fell as expected to £38,886 from £55,314. This was expected as there were no major building projects in 2018. Down £16k
- 2) MOM almost no change £10.459
- 3) Donations to URC up to £1,200 but we wanted to increase this giving so all OK
- 4) Running expenses down only slightly (£250) to £4,762
- 5) Donations are almost no change at £2,637
- 6) Pulpit supply and ministry up slightly (£600) to £3,011
- 7) Youth and children down as expected to £746 (2017 was the fence at £1.825) Down £1k+
- 8) Building maintenance fell as expected from 2017 (£14,837 when we had the car park cost). Now £1,398. Down £13k+
- 9) Evangelism and events is up to £4,958 but the income here > outaoinas so OK
- 10) Our major expense is MOM (£10,459, 27%), followed by charity, donations, tithe gifts etc (£8,368, 21%) and then church running costs (£7,392, 19%)
- 11) Projection in 2019. Some tree costs to come in 2019 and also Spring Harvest outgoings will happen this year. Probably no other major changes so slightly up.

Our estimated expenditure for 2019 is = £44,000

C. Main Funds Balances


- 1. Over all funds in 2018 are up from 2017 (from £48,128 to £62,825) so that's a good result for the year.
- 2. Generally income exceeded expenditure by £14,695
- 3. Projection in 2019 is for slightly lower income and slightly higher expenditure but we should still maintain a positive balance for 2019. No major projects are anticipated.
- HOWEVER, we still have commitments to tithe and charity giving of £9,553 and it would be wise to build up our reserves a little in the COIF account.
- ADDITIONALLY a further cautionary note is that our main restricted reserve funds held with URC central <u>fell from £209k to £184k (down</u> <u>£25k. 12%</u>) and these funds are vital to the sustained viability of the church (as it is currently financed).

We had reasonable growth in our funds in 2018 by £14,695 bringing our total funds (ignoring the Wessex Reserve funds) to £62,825. For 2019 our budgeted/estimated difference (again ignoring the Wessex Reserve funds) between income (Est £50,000) & expenditure (Est £44,000) should give us a £6,000 gain, less than 2018 but still sound.

D. Breakdown of Main Fund Balances 31/12/2018



E. Wessex Reserve & Income Fund Balances

There has been a sharp fall in the value of our restricted investments held by URC central from £209,420 to £184,085 (£25,335, 12%)

A note of caution here: a) we depend upon this account for an income of between £6,000 and £11,000 per year. A fall like this may mean lower income next year. b) Also it is a restricted fund – meaning we can not access the capital.

What differences can we make as individuals and collectively?

More churches than pubs:

The UK now has more churches than pubs, according to new data published by the National Churches Trust.

There are around 39,000 pubs in the UK, according to the latest figures from the Office of National Statistics, with more than 11,000 pubs having closed in the UK in the last decade – a fall of almost a quarter (23%).

However, there are around 40,300 church buildings in the UK open to the public and being used for worship, according to research carried out for the National Churches Trust by the Brierley Consultancy.

The number of church buildings is also substantially higher than other key public buildings in the UK. There are currently around 14,300 supermarkets operated by grocery retailers, 11,500 post office branches, 7,500 bank branches and 3,600 public libraries.

An increasing number of churches in the UK are also becoming local 'community hubs', hosting children's nurseries, senior citizen lunch clubs, concerts and exhibition venues. Some even house post offices, GP surgeries and farmers' markets. Around 6,000 of the UK's approximately 32,000 polling places are located in church buildings.

ECO TIP
