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View from the Manse

Christmas is over. After a frantic month of preparations, special events and services, Christmas day comes and Christmas day goes! By 6th January the lights and decorations are removed and stored away for another year. It is all back to business as usual...... or is it?

Twelfth night marks epiphany and the coming of the Magi to visit the Christ child Jesus (who was probably around two years old when they arrived!). They came bearing prophetic gifts of Gold for a King, Myrrh and Frankincense to anoint his body upon his death. What strange gifts for a child of lowly birth! I can just imagine Mary raising her eyebrows in disbelief (secretly thinking 'what on earth am I going to do with this lot?). The Magi, wise men as we often refer to them are often portrayed as three but in truth that has only come about because they brought three gifts. There could well have been more than three. They are reported in Matthew's gospel as coming from the East. They are likely to have come from Persia and to have been astrologers and educated men. Magi is the word root from which we get the word magician. In our nativity scenes they are often portrayed as exotic foreigners arriving. That is non-Jews, folk who do not believe in the one true God. Yet God leads them to the birthplace of the Christ child using the cosmos itself.

The word epiphany means a moment of sudden and great revelation or realisation. Specifically, in Matthew's Gospel (Matthew 2:1–12), the Magi represent the manifestation of Christ to the Gentiles. This reinforced the message that Jesus came to be revealed to all people, a light to the world. Indeed, in the early part of our ancient Hebrew scriptures (the Old Testament) Abraham was told by God that from him a great nation would come and this nation was to be a blessing to all other nations.

'and your offspring shall be like the dust of the earth, and you shall spread abroad to the west and to the east and to the north and to the south; and all the families of the earth shall be blessed in you and in your offspring.' (Genesis 28:14)

So, the wise men came and searched diligently for the child and when they found him, Matthew tells us that they were overwhelmed with Joy and presented to him their gifts and knelt before him to pay homage. Such foreigners, Gentiles, would have been considered 'unclean' in Jewish law. Yet here we see them not only seeking out this infant king but kneeling before him in worship. In Jesus they were overwhelmed by Joy.

So, the twinkling lights of Christmas are packed away once more. May we be reminded, as we think about these exotic Gentile visitors, that receiving

the revelation of the true identity of Jesus should bring us great joy too. Great joy is something we should share with others. Jesus is not just for Christmas. God's word made flesh in Jesus is for us all, for eternity, for our transformation. As we journey on may our hearts and lives be transformed by the revelation that Jesus came to earth as a vulnerable baby just for us. He came because God loves us so much that he gave us his only son. May we love God's son in response to God's love for us all.

Carol Scott interviews Peter Bentall -Lay Preacher

Carol – Thank you Peter for agreeing to be interviewed. We are trying to get to know a little more about members of our congregation.

First question – How long have you been a Christian?

Peter – I was brought up in a Congregationalist family so always went to church when young. At school we went to chapel every day and twice on Sundays, but I really did not begin to understand about being a Christian until University.

Carol – You were not born in Basingstoke so how did you end up here?

Peter – I was born in Tonbridge, Kent and I went to University in Nottingham (Civil Engineering). That was when I was introduced to the Congregational/Presbyterian community. More on this later. My first job was for Kent County Council, then I took a year out in NW Greece with a VSO-type organisation and there I met Ruth (a Catholic!); this gave me the interest in working overseas. So, off we went to Uganda for 2 years, Kenya for 2.5 years then back to Maidstone. I went to work for Scott Wilson in London and they decamped in 1973 to Basingstoke. In 1986 I went to work for the International Labour Organisation in Ghana for 3.5 years, came back for a year, then off to Zimbabwe for 3 years, then became an independent consultant in 1994. This meant short trips – mainly Africa; in fact I have been to 19 different countries in Africa and 26 around the world. I retired at the age of 70 in 2010.

Carol – You have had a very varied career and you and Ruth raised a family.

Peter – We have 4 children, 1 born in Uganda! Ruth travelled with the children in tow; when young the three elder children never really lived in the UK.

Carol – What brought you to London Street.

Peter – As I was non-conformist and lived in Oakley, I attended the Methodist Chapel there but my Grandmother was a Sapp, an old London Street family, so it was logical for me to join London Street and it was the only Congregational Church in Basingstoke.

Carol – You were an Elder for many years, what made you give it up?

Peter – I was an ordained Elder for many years, and made the conscious decision to give it up to encourage others to take an active part in the church. I have concentrated on Lay Preaching, which started in Nottingham University when the Presbyterian/Congregational Society took the Sunday evening services in the area; there may have been only 8-10 in the congregation. I was always grateful for all local Christian fellowships in all the countries where I worked.

Carol – Can you tell us what you are involved with at London Street?

Peter – I'm a Lay Preacher. Wednesday lunch time worship is a real commitment. People from outside drop in and in these worship sessions listening is so important. I also attend or lead Lent, Advent and other study groups.

Carol – Would you change anything at London Street?

Peter – Courses – it often seems it's the same people that attend, we need to encourage different people to attend. I understand the pressures of work of the next generation, and children's sporting activities mean we need to be more flexible with church times to encourage young people to attend, like Messy Church. We are so blessed that many people at London Street are involved in activities.

Carol - What do you do for leisure activities?

Peter – I play tennis twice a week and squash, this I have played since I was 13 years old! I am, and have been, a member of the cricket club since 1974. Of course, I watch Kent cricket, travelling to see them when I can. Ruth and I try to be involved in both of our churches, we go to concerts at the Anvil and Haymarket and go to London to see Clare, our daughter, in an amateur orchestra. Then there are the 8 grandchildren with ages 4-19!

Carol – Is there anything members might be surprised to learn?

Peter – Yes, I have actually played cricket at Lord's (at school) and Trent Bridge (at University).

Carol – Thank you for sharing your journey through life and for God's part in this journey. May this journey continue with God's guidance.
