View from the Manse

In January the press loves to bombard us with programmes and articles about the latest diet or fitness fads. As we enter into February, we then get bombarded by holiday advertising luring us to book flights to beach holidays with the beautiful people in some exotic places. And then comes Valentine's Day and the commercial pressure to be loved and show love and if you can't do either of those you may be a bit of a loser. Basically, advertising is designed to help others make money out of us by making us feel guilty so that we consume more and more stuff. Jesus came to show us a radically new way of living, through him we are assured of being loved. I can see that for young people, glued to their phones and social media pretty much 24/7, the pressures to conform and fit in and consume more and more can seem very compelling and almost claustrophobic. On the radio this week I heard that the fashion journalists have decided that, on average, the new clothes that young people buy are only worn twice before being discarded. The fashion industry needs to rethink thiswe all need to rethink the way we are living!

The terrible bush fires continue to rage in Australia as I write this. According to the BBC news from today, some 27 people have so far have been killed - including four firefighters - and an estimated 10 million hectares (100,000 sq km or 15.6 million acres) of bush, forest and parks across Australia have to date been burned. This equates to what looks like around two-thirds of the UK burning! I am sure by the time you read this, the fires will have claimed even more lives and a greater area of land. In Australia even the sun and the moon have turned red.

In the face of such natural calamities as volcanic eruptions, Tsunamis, fires, droughts, floods and melting glaciers, we see how powerless we actually are in the midst of God's mighty and powerful creation.

We are all responsible for nurturing and caring for the beautiful balance of creation. In Genesis 9:1-3, after the flood of the earth, Noah was told to *'be fruitful and multiply, and fill the earth'*, God

also told Noah that God gave him and all his offspring **all** of creation in which to be fruitful. Well, humanity has certainly filled the earth!

God gave humankind creation but with that great gift comes responsibilities to maintain creation's balance and order. This we have not done. We have used, abused and consumed and are continuing to do so. We cannot continue to do so without impunity! The speeches and actions of Greta Thunberg, such a young voice calling out in the wilderness, appear to have stirred many. Extinction Rebellion, labelled at one time as a terrorist movement (now recently changed), is made up of variety of ordinary people like you and me, people from varied walks of life, from professionals to students. People who see the future as bleak, unless the way we all live changes drastically before it is too late. These are worrying times indeed.

Re-wilding, treating farming in a totally different way, may be a way forward. Organic farmers, using re-wilding techniques, seem quite rapidly to see a return of bees, butterflies, birds and other wildlife. It seems that re-wilding land enables the natural balance and order of creation to return. But like all such things, the solutions can be complex and have wider implications. We have many mouths to feed and many living on small budgets that would exclude them from shopping for organically grown products. Our national and global structures of trade have economic and political implications. But what is clear, is that we all have a responsibility to consume more ethically when we can, and consume less.

Without faith this can all feel rather bleak indeed. The levels of depression among our young people is quite overwhelming when you look at the statistics. But as people of faith we have a different perspective to offer. Jesus came to live among us as God's love for all creation, restoring, renewing and reviving wherever he went. He died on the cross, taking upon himself the sins of the world. He rose again to show us that he is sovereign over all creation. We live in the in-between times. His kingdom is being established and will be established in full at his return.

Then there will be a new heaven and a new earth. What we need to do is be faithful, humble ourselves before the cross, be Christ's beacon lights of hope in a darkening and confusing world. Read Romans 8this is our sure hope in Jesus Christ!

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Peter Bentall interviews Joy Williams:

Peter: Thank you Joy for agreeing to be interviewed. How long have you been a Christian?

Joy: As long as I can remember. From a young age I prayed and was taught to ask Jesus to help me. My parents were both committed Christians. They worshipped at London Street and I was baptised there. They subsequently went to the Methodist Church (Dad's denomination) which had an afternoon Sunday School. Sundays and Church became very unpopular with me and I tried to avoid going as it was a time to spend with my friends! The return to London Street was influenced by the excellent preaching and the morning junior church so at least I had the afternoon free! I was about 10 then, but when I was around 13 or 14 I started 'listening' to the evening sermons and understanding more.

Peter: When did you become involved at London Street?

Joy: I joined the Youth Club when I was about 13.

Peter: How did you develop your involvement?

Joy: I was given the job of collecting the subs. That led to becoming the youth club treasurer and then secretary. Club members took part in the monthly Evening Youth Services (the start of my Lay Preaching interest); I was on the Mission Committee and, with some friends, we ran monthly sales and coffee mornings to raise money for a new organ.

Peter: How did life in London Street progress?

Joy: The Youth Services were really popular with all ages (often standing room only!). The youth club developed into an 18/30 club as we all got older. There was a badminton club and a drama group over in May Place where young people and adults mixed and where I got to know Charles, whom I married in 1965.

After that I was made a Deacon (Elder from 1972), Chair of the Mission Committee and edited the Focus magazine.

Both our sons were born in Basingstoke and around 1980 I was made Church Treasurer - for a short time I was both Treasurer and Secretary concurrently. I then handed over as Treasurer and continued as Secretary until quite recently.

Peter: You have been a Lay Preacher for many years.

Joy: Yes, I completed the Congregational Church Course around 1960 and then became involved in the Charismatic Renewal and learned about being baptised in the Holy Spirit which opened up new insights for preaching. I still preach occasionally at London Street and elsewhere.

Peter: Apart from Church involvement what do you do in your leisure time?

Joy: I still play bowls; I like most sport; I walk in the countryside as often as possible - I love the outdoors, but also enjoy reading and watching TV.

Peter: Is there anything Members might be surprised to learn about you?

Joy: Probably many things! I played cricket at 14 for Hants Ladies under 18s and, when working for the Air Ministry in London, represented them at tennis against the Navy.

Peter: Thank you, Joy, for sharing your Christian journey and lifelong commitment to God's work at London Street.

2nd February – The Presentation of Christ in the Temple/Candlemas

In bygone centuries, Christians said their last farewells to the Christmas season on Candlemas, 2nd February. This is exactly 40 days after Christmas Day itself.

In New Testament times 40 days old was an important age for a baby boy: it was when they made their first 'public appearance'. Mary, like all good Jewish mothers, went to the Temple with Jesus, her first male child - to 'present Him to the Lord'. At the same time, she, as a new mother, was 'purified'. Thus, we have the Festival of the Presentation of Christ in the Temple.

So where does the Candlemas bit come in? Jesus is described in the New Testament as the Light of the World, and early Christians developed the tradition of lighting many candles in celebration of this day. The Church also fell into the custom of blessing the year's supply of candles for the church on this day - hence the name, Candlemas.

The story of how Candlemas began can be found in Luke 2:22-40. Simeon's great declaration of faith and recognition of who Jesus was is, of course, found in the Nunc Dimittis, which is embedded in the Office of Evening Prayer in the West. But in medieval times, the Nunc Dimittis was mostly used just on this day, during the distribution of candles before the Eucharist. Only gradually did it win a place in the daily prayer life of the Church.

Fay Spurr:

In the 1970s Fay was actively involved with our monthly fundraising activities, especially when London Street became involved with The Council for World Mission. She often helped out in the Church kitchen and welcomed everyone to her home in Old Basing for a 'Travelling Supper'.

Through the missionary friend of a previous Church Secretary, London Street became involved with Papua New Guinea. From time to time the friend would visit London Street when she was home on furlough and, in the 1980s Fay corresponded with Ministers of Churches there.

Fay was very kind to the residents of Pages over the years, taking them out for drives.

14 February - Valentine's Day

There are two confusing things about this day of romance and anonymous love-cards strewn with lace, cupids and ribbon: firstly, there seems to have been two different Valentines in the 4th century - one a priest martyred on the Flaminian Way, under the emperor Claudius, the other a bishop of Terni martyred at Rome. And neither seems to have had any clear connection with lovers or courting couples.

So why has Valentine become the patron saint of romantic love? By Chaucer's time the link was assumed to be because on these saints' day - 14 February - the birds are supposed to pair. Or perhaps the custom of seeking a partner on St Valentine's Day is a surviving scrap of the old Roman Lupercalia festival, which took place in the middle of February.

One of the Roman gods honoured during this Festival was Pan, the god of nature. Another was Juno, the goddess of women and marriage. During the Lupercalia it was a popular custom for young men to draw the name of a young unmarried woman from a name-box. The two would then be partners or 'sweethearts' during the time of the celebrations. Even modern Valentine decorations bear an ancient symbol of love - Roman cupids with their bows and love-arrows.

There are no churches in England dedicated to Valentine, but since 1835 his relics have been claimed by the Carmelite church in Dublin.
