THOUGHT FOR THE MONTH

This month Beryl Wootton discusses the festival of Halloween and whether it is compatible with our Christian beliefs.

A few days ago it was Halloween. I don't know if you were affected or whether you even thought much about it. Not that we could miss all the



displays that were in the shops for the last month!! How much do we Christians know about the origins of Halloween? Is it wise for Christians to be involved with Halloween at all? Lets look at some words of Scripture to see God's thoughts and feelings on this subject.

Deuteronomy 18:9

When you come into the Land that the Lord your God is giving you, don't follow the disgusting practices of the nations that are there.

After all if you read Exodus Chapter 20 you will see God says, *'I am the Lord your God...You shall have no gods before me.'*

The story told in 1 Kings Chapter 18 contains these words, '*The Lord – He is God! The Lord - He is God!*'

I think the story of Elijah challenging the false god Baal is well known. If not please read 1 Kings chapter 18 verses 16-39.

Back to Halloween. A festival at this time of the year goes back to the time of the Celts, about 500 BC. There was a secret society, whose priests were called Druids. They worshipped nature - especially Oak Trees and Mistletoe. Celtic kings feared the Druids.

The Celts had 400 gods and one was called "Samhain", the god of death. He was worshipped on 31st October, which was the last day of the northern autumn, and also their New Year's Eve. On this night Samhain allowed the spirits of those who had died the previous year to return for a few hours to associate with their families.

The Druids carried a hollowed out pumpkin with a candle inside. They would go from house to house demanding special foods. If these were supplied, obediently, they would leave for the next house. That's the origin of 'Trick or Treat'. By the 8th century, the Christian Church (now more political than spiritual) had attempted to overlay many pagan festivals and holidays with a "Christian" veneer. To counter Samhain, the Pope decreed November 1st as "All Saints Day" to honour the Christian Dead. This attempted substitution did not work, because another name for All Saints Day was All Hallows Day. So the night before became All Hallows Evening, which has since become Halloween.

Modern "Halloween" began with the migration of many Irish folk to America at the time of the Potato Famine in the 1800's. It is now promoted by Pagans of various kinds, along with commercial interests, who see it as a way to make a lot of money from the desire of children to dress up. Children today love to dress up in fancy costumes, so it really has become a popular part of Halloween, but Pagans, and those involved in the occult, still celebrate on October 31st - so occult activity is heightened at this time.

For myself, I abhor Halloween. I have tried giving out 'tracts' to trick or treat callers, but that back fired with the tracts torn up and scattered on my drive. Once I had eggs thrown at my front door!!! Have you tried getting dried egg off? Lastly I downloaded a poster from our local Police asking people not to call, and I must say we did not have callers that year. Now that I have moved to Lady Susan Court I won't get trick or treat callers, BUT the 'events' group here puts up Halloween decorations. Even worse this year they will be linking Halloween and bonfire night, which is my birthday!! I shall be elsewhere!

MEMORIES

Revd. Josh Thomas reflects on the importance of what we leave behind.

I've often mused on November as being the month of remembrance and indeed, I've written church magazine articles on it before. We remember those dear friends we have lost on

November 1st, we remember, remember on the 5th of November and on the 11th, we think of all of those who have lost their lives in conflict throughout the years. This week, as I've been reflecting on and writing my sermon, I've been immersed in a couple of scripture readings which have really hit home to me the importance of memories and what it is we will leave behind when we are gone. Hannah's prayer of praise in 1 Samuel 2 is such a well-known story in scripture and it is one that we often turn to if we need to illustrate the importance of saying thank you to God. She had promised to dedicate the life of her son to God and this prayer of praise is the outpouring of a heart that is eternally grateful for the gift and the responsibility that has been given to her.

Contrasting with this is a passage from 2 Timothy in which Paul who is nearing the end of his life, laments about those friends he has lost and the loneliness that he is feeling as a result of those partings. We have two readings here which contrast so vividly but I think they both serve as important reminders that we can take anything to God, whether we are feeling jubilant or whether we feel horrendous.

Hannah's prayer in particular led me to think what it is that we will be remembered for. Churches, unlike any other public space, have an interesting history of brass plaques. I can think of several places around all of the church buildings I visit regularly that have a plaque commemorating an object to someone who has gifted it in the first place. Whilst these gifts are so important and hugely valued, it is often the case that generations later, these names do not mean anything to the people using the building today. It is a sad reality that although these names are on our walls, our collection plates, in our hymnbooks etc, to many, they don't mean anything.



Hannah's song has been immortalised because it is such a humble but genuine outpouring of praise. Paul is remembered for sharing the good news and encouraging others to come into a relationship with Jesus Christ. Whilst for a season, it is lovely to have our names etched on to something, surely what is more important is the legacy we leave behind us? We are designed to be relational beings, this means sharing together in the extremes of life, praying for one another, caring for one another and sharing our stories together.

We will be remembered for the relationships we have shared with one another, for the impact that one encouraging word had on someone 50 years ago in their walk with Jesus. So, let's do our best to get to know one another, to walk the journey alongside one another and let's do our best to be remembered for the way we have shown Jesus Christ's love for the world in what we do and what we say.

ARE YOU SCAM AWARE?

Rebecca Dumbleton shares her professional experience as we approach a time of giving and, sadly, scamming.

With Christmas fast approaching and, in this increasingly digital age, I felt it important to follow up on last month's Citizens Advice article regarding scams. Since Covid, scamming has increased exponentially, especially online. The main people being targeted are the older generation and those who are not as computer savvy, however, saying that, I am aware of all generations being affected, even those who work in the financial industry. All you need is for a call or message to come through at the wrong time and they potentially have a foot in the door.

I work for a high street bank and there are a few things we look out for when assisting our customers. This is not an exclusive list however, coupled with last month's article, I hope it will guide you so you stay safe:

1. Buying online: Does the website address bar have a https address (denoted by a padlock)? If possible, use PayPal or Debit/Credit cards

to pay. It is unlikely they will request you to transfer funds to their account but, if they do, check with your Bank that the details match and it is a reasonable request. Never pay by cash!

2. Receiving a message from a friend or family member: If they ask you to contact them on a new phone number because their phone is 'broken', always contact them using their existing details first. Be suspicious of anyone requesting funds but refusing to talk to you face to face, over video chat, or over a voice call.

3. Trusted phone calls: The Police, the Fraud Squad and your bank will NEVER call you and ask you to move funds from your account. They will NEVER use you to catch bank staff who are taking part in illegal activities. If you are contacted by your bank and they want you to give them any details, hang up and call the number you have on the back of your card either from a different phone or wait 10 minutes before using the same line. Fraudsters can spoof (imitate) the number they call from to make it look like it is from a trusted person. They can also hold the line open once you have hung up so when you call back you are actually talking with them not your Bank etc. Any legitimate financial institution will understand and wait for your call.

4. Charities: This is a very hard one to discuss due to the nature of their need. Most charities are legitimate and will display a charity number on their website which can then be double-checked at:

https://register-of-charities.charitycommission.gov.uk/charity-search

Always pay by debit or credit card. Do not feel pressured into giving at any point and always kept in mind to only donate what you can afford.

A scammer's biggest weapon is secrecy and their biggest fear is people talking about their experiences, so if in any doubt, ask! Talk to family and friends, pass on the details of this and last month's articles. Your bank is there to help you and will happily answer any questions you have. Do not feel embarrassed or upset, we are happy to help. Remember, if it seems too good to be true, it more than likely is. Take time to think, do not be rushed into anything.

With open discourse and taking things slow, we will hopefully have a safe and enjoyable Christmas.
