THOUGHT FOR THE MONTH

This month Alison Jamieson discusses 'Journeys of Life'.



These days, it seems to me that, we think of journeys as being linear, A to B to C to D, the shortest and quickest distance between where we are and the destination, probably according to Satnav? But, if we were on holiday we might take the scenic route, such as the 'Root 500' round the north coast of Scotland; very beautiful and with many twists and turns, not to mention single track roads.

Life can also be considered a journey; growing up physically to adulthood, learning how to manage life, meeting all sorts of challenges and excitements. Certainly, the Christian life is like that. Whether we were brought up in the church, used to its stories, its teaching, and customs, or have had no contact with the Christian Community. At some point we, who are now members of the church, have made a decision to follow Christ. We go from being 'Seekers' to being 'Disciples', having accepted the basic truths of who He is and what He has done.

As Disciples, we now need to learn what that means in everyday life, getting to grips with the spiritual aspects of life, applying His teaching in our everyday life; what does that look like? How does our life change; new habits; worshipping in community and learning every Sunday in church; praying daily and developing our relationship with Jesus and getting used to bringing ourselves, and our concerns for others and the world, to Him. To grow through reading and understanding the Bible. It could be on our own but maybe with others. Through every moment we grow, learn, and, ultimately, see things as Jesus sees them, to grow in faith trusting Him.

I don't think that the Christian life is ever a straight journey from A to B, well not often. There are times when life is distracting, or there are pressures in the family, or at work, and even successes can lead us away. Then we need to get ourselves back on track, and so at times, the journey feels like a revolving door instead!

In our 'Discipleship', we will find that we will gradually be asked to

help alongside other Christians. We shouldn't be surprised at this; after all, Jesus himself came as a servant, willing to do what his Father asked him to do, understanding that it was needed. We all have gifts that we can use for the benefit of the Christian community and its 'mission'. So, we follow Jesus and become 'Servants', learning through doing along with our fellow Christians. Using the gifts we have and the gifts that He gives, along with his love and peace we learn to look at the world around us with His eyes and see where we can help people, whether it is our neighbours, the person on the bus, or a friend who needs a listening ear.

I wonder where you are on your journey?

Who knows where our journey will lead but it is purposeful, to a good end, and we are not alone, ever!

MAY I INTRODUCE...

Our new Church Secretary, Gill Miller, shares with us a little information on her background.

As I commence my role as Church Secretary, I feel it is appropriate to give a little information about how I got to today!

My Christian journey began as a five-year-old, when my neighbour in Shirley Southampton would call for me and take me to Sunday School at our local Methodist Church. I joined the Girls Life Brigade, and I have fond memories of marching around the neighbourhood on a Sunday, accompanied by the Boys Brigade Band.

Youth Club followed and, aged 19, I married Keith at the same Methodist Church. My attendance at church became less regular as I spent three years training to be a State Registered Nurse and then working as a Staff Nurse on a high care surgical ward. Following this I undertook further training and qualified as a midwife.

We moved to Hedge End, Southampton and I became the local District Nurse /Midwife. My husband was an ambulanceman and we occasionally joined forces on emergency calls!

My first son Russell was born in 1978.

In 1980 we embarked on a new adventure and moved back to Shirley and purchased our first care home for seven residents. I ran this single handed, along with a two-year-old for the first six months, until Keith left the ambulance service and joined me in running the home.

We welcomed our second son, James, in 1983 and then purchased a second seven bedded home. I ran one home and Keith ran the other. Logistics made this difficult and in 1986 we sold both and purchased two joined semi-detached houses which were in derelict condition.

After some months renovating these properties (I have fond memories of my dear Dad endlessly painting woodwork for weeks on end) including installing fire protection, warden call, and a commercial kitchen, we were ready to open.

In 1988 we welcomed our third son Oliver.

This was followed by another addition. An extension to the home

adding extra rooms to complete our plans for 20 beds. We cared for older people, many with mental health issues, dementia, bipolar disorder, schizophrenia, and in later years alcoholism. It was a challenging but rewarding time.

Many happy years followed raising our children whilst running the business and all the challenges that offered.

During this time I joined Freemantle URC, becoming an elder and also a member of the very active choir. Many happy memories remain of my time at Freemantle. I was one of several 'young mums' and we were blessed to call several young ministers to their first pastorate. One being Revd. George Watt who is now Moderator of Thames North Synod.

Sadly in 1999 I felt I could no longer cope with the demands of the care home and after much agonizing I left and completed a Social Work degree at Southampton University.

We were having difficult times, and Keith and I divorced in 2000, and I returned to run the care home along with my eldest son.

My time at Freemantle came to an end when I, in some ways, felt ostracized by the church due to my decision to divorce.

Then followed somewhat turbulent times. I married again in 2003 only for it to end in a very acrimonious divorce in 2008. A year of paying for legal fees, barrister costs, and court cases proved to be my downfall. Eventually everything I had spent 30 years building was lost.

I had no business and eventually no home.

There are times in life when plans don't work out and it is easy to despair and give up hope.

Luckily, I was able to find suitable rented accommodation and after moving to Hedge End I took a position as a post office clerk. This was not a very stimulating job but my co-workers were very kind and supportive.

I visited the Methodist church and Parish church, but I never felt truly settled.

Then in what I still feel was divine intervention I was one day scrolling

through posts on my computer when a job vacancy appeared for an Estate Manager with Anchor. The job description sounded interesting but most importantly the job came with accommodation. It was in a place called Hook. I had no idea where this was but it was a lifeline for me so I was prepared to move away and leave family and friends behind and so I moved to Berry Court, Hook.

I was so happy. I loved the job, and my flat soon became home. It was not too far from Southampton so my family could visit.

Now it was time to find a welcoming church and give thanks for the blessings I had found.

After visiting two or three churches it was Easter Day 2018 when I found myself in the car park at 'Top of Town' totally lost and looking for London Street URC.

Suddenly a voice called "Are you lost?"

It was Joyce Cook on her way to church. I was taken under her wing and soon introduced to the church family at London St.

So began my journey in faith through transfer of membership, election as Elder and now Church Secretary.

I have also been blessed to now have a home that is warm, comfortable, and secure, and a job I continue to do and enjoy.

Sometimes you have to let go of the picture of what you thought life would be like and learn to find joy in the story you are living.






